Cavite City among PH’s hottest cities

CAVITE CITY, Cavite -- Sangley Point in this province is among the hottest points in the country with the most dangerous heat indexes this summer, scoring a heat index of 42.7° Celsius observed at 2 p.m., the state weather bureau reported on Tuesday.

Sangley Point, located in the northern portion of the Cavite City peninsula, is surrounded by the Manila Bay.

Heat index is defined as a measure indicating the level of discomfort the average person is thought to experience as a result of the combined ef-

fects of the temperature and humidity in the air.

In the said April 9 report from Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA), the maximum heat index of 51.7° Celsius was observed over Dagupan City at 2 p.m. Tuesday.

Other cities on the “dangerous heat index levels” list includes Cuyo, Palawa (46.2°C), Tuguegarao City, Cagayan -- 43.5°C, Daet, Camarines Norte -- 43.1°C, Calapan, Oriental Mindoro -- 43.1°C, Aparri, Cagayan - - 43°C, Catbalogan, Western Samar - 42.6°C, Baler,

MANILA,-- Filipino high school students took home 10 medals including two gold at an international math competition in Vietnam.

The country, through the Mathematics Trainers Guild-Philippines (MTG), sent eight junior and senior high school students to the 16th Hanoi Open Mathematics Challenge held from April 2 to 6 and organized by the Hanoi Department of Education and Training, and Hanoi Mathematical Society.

Winning gold medals are Grade 10 students Bryce Ainsley Sanchez of Grace Christian College and Immanuel Josiah Balete of St. Stephen's High School.

The silver medalists are Grade 8 students Enzo Rafael Chan of Bayanihan Institute-Tarlac and Rickson Caleb Tan of MGC New Life Christian Academy.

ibinigay sa mga kababaihang kagaya ko (Being given the opportunity to join PNPA and graduate as one is the biggest change given to us women).”

She even encouraged all other women who are interested to join PNPA to give it a try. With determination and God’s guidance, she said any woman can make it through just like what she did.

“Sa lahat po ng graduates ng Philippine Na-

As an empowered woman and a privileged PNPA graduate, she also challenged all her fellow PNPA alumni to keep in mind the very reason they entered the Academy, which is to serve the Filipino people.

give as long as two years," Gordon said during the Commemoration of the 77th Araw ng Kagitingan and Philippine Veterans Week held at Fort Bonifacio last Friday.
"Ang mga bata dapat marunong magsundalo. Dapat kaya nilang lumaban para sa bayan kung kailangan," he added.
The senator was the guest of honor and speaker at the said event. His father, former Olongapo City Mayor James Leonard Tagle Gordon, was given a posthumous award as one of the heroes of World War II. He was assigned as a junior officer under the Intelligence Staff engaged in intelligence gathering and monitoring the Province of Zambales. He had the rank of a first lieutenant and joined the resistance on November 1, 1943.
Wanting to foster patriotism and nationalism among the youth, Gordon filed, last year, Senate Bill No. 1417, or the Citizen Service Act of 2017 which proposes to require all college students and those of technical vocational courses to undergo basic citizen service training.
Likewise noting that the country faces a buffet of disasters, both natural and man-made, Gordon stressed the importance of having an army of reserved officers who could be called upon and mobilized to assist in matters of external and territorial defense, internal security and peace and order, and disaster risk reduction and management.

Aurora -- 42.3°C, Cotabato City -- 42.3°C, Dipolog City, Zamboanga Del Norte -- 41.4°C, Virac, Catanduanes --41.2°C, Masbate City, Masbate -- 41.1°C.
Department of Health Regional Director Eduardo C. Janairo told the PNA on Wednesday that "short or prolonged period of exposure to high temperature may lead, or cause heat-related conditions such as asthma, heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps, heat syncope (fainting), and heat rash."
He advised the public to stay indoors or in cooler places especially from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., to drink plenty of water and use light colored clothes as preventive measures to heat-related health problems.
Janairo likewise warned the public about other summer related diseases such as measles, rabies, diarrhea, hepatitis, cholera, typhoid fever and influenza-like diseases, which are common during summer months. (PNA)

Avoid bringing small children or babies in crowded places to prevent them from contracting diseases, as they have weaker resistance against infections compared to adults.
People with high blood pressure and other diseases which can be aggravated by severe heat and too much sun exposure are advised to take their maintenance medicines everyday and to stay at home, especially between 10AM to 3PM, when the temperature is at its peak.
The DOH also reminds the public of the risks associated with using unsterilized sharp nails and other sharp objects during flagellations.

The AMRSP was reacting to the military's allegation that the Rural Missionaries of the Philippines has been assisting the New People's Army in Mindanao.
The military has earlier asked the European Union to stop funding to RMP and other human rights groups it accused as fronts of the communist rebels.
The RMP, an alliance of Catholic religious congregations in Mindanao, was established in 1969 as a Church response to the plight of people in "most forgotten places".
"Let the members of the RMP do their jobs where we in the government and church agencies have failed to go to address issues of peace, education, respect for life, freedom, dignity of persons, good governance and good politics in the far-flung rural areas," they added.
The AMRSP is an association of 327 religious congregations in the Philippines currently co-chaired by Sr. Regina Kuizon, RGS, and Fr. Cielito Almazan, OFM./source:By CBCP News

LAGUNA TOWN AMONG 'BALIKATAN' RECIPIENTS

PANGUIL, Laguna -- Village folks in the remote hillside of Barangay Balian here were among the recipients of a day-long community health care engagement (CHE), a "Balikatan" activity involving the defense forces of the Philippines, the US and Australia.

In an interview with the Philippine News Agency (PNA), Lt. Commander Liz Vidallon of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) public affairs office said the CHE is part of the 35th iteration of the Philippines-US joint "Balikatan" exercises, being participated in by 4,000 Filipino soldiers, 3,500 American troops, and 50 members of the Australian defense force.

An AFP contingent and about 12 members of the US and three Australian defense forces joined the humanitarian and civic assistance projects in this primarily agricultural town.

Vidallon said the soldiers are grouped in different teams for the series of activities and tasks conducted in parts of northern and southern Luzon.

Although the "bayanihan" (helping together) engagement kicked off April 1, the engineering team began construction of the three two-room classroom buildings and a village medical clinic here last month and they are expected to be completed in time for the culminating activities on April 12, she added.

"Bayanihan" activities serve to empower local communities through training on basic life support, disaster preparedness, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and first aid, among others, which could be applied during disasters, she said.

"It is best for local communities to be the first responders," Vidallon said. The training courses have been suggested by local authorities and the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) to capacitate villagers to be resilient during calamity or disaster.

"These lectures are being conducted depending on the need of the local people. We conducted initial interviews and site validations prior to the community engagements," Lt. Mary Morin, US Navy officer-in-charge of the CHE, told PNA.

Activities also included the construction of a school building, circumcision of some 60 boys, physical hygiene, oral hygiene, veterinary care, vector management and other public health concerns.

"We're all excited to be here, in this beautiful barangay, drawing amazing support from the community by helping us get together. Every locality that we visited is very welcoming and that they are really accepting our help and support, and we are also bringing supplies for the people," Morin said.

She also described the excitement among mothers and children who gathered for the lectures and puppet show by the Australian team led by an environmental health officer doing the educational activity in the classroom.

"Right now is purely work," she said. "Every place that we've been to is beautiful and we expect other places would be amazing as well."

Meanwhile, 2nd Lt. Tori Sharpe, Communications Strategy and Operations Officer of the 3D Marine Logistics Group of the US Marine Corps "Sustaining the Pacific", said their team of engineering, medical, dental, environmental health and basic life support is "here to share their craft."

"Being able to work together in order to respond and help people is truly amazing. Hoping these engagements would have lasting impacts," Sharpe said. source:(PNA)

Day of Valor 2019 and 2020

Day of Valor is a public holiday in the Philippines every 9 April to commemorate the fall of the Bataan peninsula during World War II.

Year	Date	Day	Holiday
2019	9 Apr	Tue	Day of Valor
2020	9 Apr	Thu	Day of Valor

The Bataan peninsula fell after months of fighting between the Philippine and American armies and the invading Japanese. The united Philippine-US army, depleted of food, medicine and ammunition, was forced to surrender to the Japanese on 9 April, 1942. The now prisoners of war consisted of 68,000 Filipinos and 11,796 Americans. The Japanese, unprepared for the large number of prisoners, decided to move them by foot from Bataan to another base located 140 kilometres away in San Fernando.

On this forced trek, known as the "Death March of Bataan", many prisoners died due to starvation, disease, dehydration and exhaustion on their way to San Fernando. Many prisoners were also murdered along the way. However, the prolonged defense of the Bataan peninsula hindered the Japanese army's progress, enabling the Filipino and US forces to prepare for subsequent battles and ultimately win the war against the Japanese.

This gruesome period during the war is used as a reminder of the courage tenacity and willingness to sacrifice to the point of death by the Philippine and American forces. It also is a day to remember Filipinos who continue to fight for freedom on behalf of the Philippines.

Many parades are held involving World War II veterans in different cities. The main event is held at the Mt Samat Shrine in Pilár, Bataan where the President of the Philippines and other dignitaries give speeches honouring the country's veterans.

battle with only the Holy Image of Santo Niño left intact. "St. Gregory" was also burned and destroyed during the Philippine Revolution against Spain but was impressively restored, capturing the 18th century.

The church is famous for its impressive interiors, paintings on the ceiling, and the old pulpit platform, which gives prominence to the officiating priest during Mass.

There is also the old church in Tanza town, the Sta. Cruz Parish Church, where Gen. Aguinaldo and Gen. Mariano Trias took their oaths as President and Vice President of the Philippine Revolutionary Government some 120 years ago.

Last is the Saint Francis of Assisi Parish Church in General Trias where the Banda Matanda, a local marching band, practiced the Marcha Filipina – the music of the Philippine National Anthem, before they played it when independence was proclaimed in Kawit town on June 12, 1898. (PNA)

‘Visita Iglesia’ in Cavite, a mix of spiritual and historical journey

KAWIT, Cavite – The Holy Week is a very sacred time for Filipinos, a time for reflection and penance, and a time for honoring traditions, such as the pabasa (chanting/singing of the Passion of Christ), the Way of the Cross, and the Visita Iglesia.

As millions of devout Catholics make the rounds of at least seven churches to commemorate the last days of Jesus on earth, pilgrims may opt to add a “historical” twist to this annual tradition by doing it in the historical province of Cavite.

Cavite’s churches not just present colonial influences but they have figured well in the nation’s history, former Kawit tourism officer and now freelance curator, Angelo Jarin Aguinaldo, said in an interview on Thursday.

His advice as an ideal first stop from Manila, a few minutes’ drive down South, is the Iglesia Catolica Apostolica Romana Parish of St. Michael the Archangel.

Located along Evangelista St. in Bacoor

City, this was where Fr. Mariano Gomez served as one of its parish priests.

“Gomez is the GOM in GOMBURZA – the three Filipino priests who were executed (on) charges of subversion arising from the 1872 Cavite mutiny,” Aguinaldo added.

In nearby Kawit town is where you will find the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, where the first president of the Philippine Republic, Gen. Emilio Aguinaldo, was baptized. Saint Maria Magdalena is known as the patroness of the Revolutionists.

It is located near Gen. Aguinaldo’s birth house, which has been turned into a Shrine and museum in his honor and run by the National Historical Commission of the Philippines (NHCP).

Saint Mary Magdalene is believed to be the general’s inspiration in naming his Katipunan council “Magdalo”.

Just a few minutes’ drive from Kawit is the town famous for its smoked fish – Rosario.

“This is where you’ll find the image of Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary, Reina de Caracol, who saved the lives of people in the midst of a strong typhoon during the Spanish era,” Aguinaldo said.

Historical accounts reveal that the church was burned in 1896 at the height of the Katipuneros’ hostilities against the friars, and was converted into a “cuartel” of revolutionaries during the fight with the Americans in 1901.

Another popular church in Cavite that boasts

of priceless religious relics and high-vaulted ceilings reminiscent of the Spanish colonial era and the Katipunan period, is the Imus Cathedral of Our Lady of the Pillar.

Built by the Jesuits, the cathedral was declared a structure of historical significance in November 2006.

In Dasmariñas City, the Immaculate Conception Church -- the city’s first Catholic church -- was the site of the bloody Battle of Perez Dasmariñas, a Cavite offensive in 1897 commanded by Major Gen. Jose de Lachambre to recapture Cavite since the loss at the twin battles of Binakayan and Dalahican.

Close to it, in Silang town, sits the church known for its Spanish colonial architectural style and Rococo-influenced retablos called the Our Lady of Candelaria Parish Church.

The church served as kuta (camp) of the guardia sibil (civil guards) at the height of the hostilities of Filipino revolutionaries to Spanish friars in 1896.

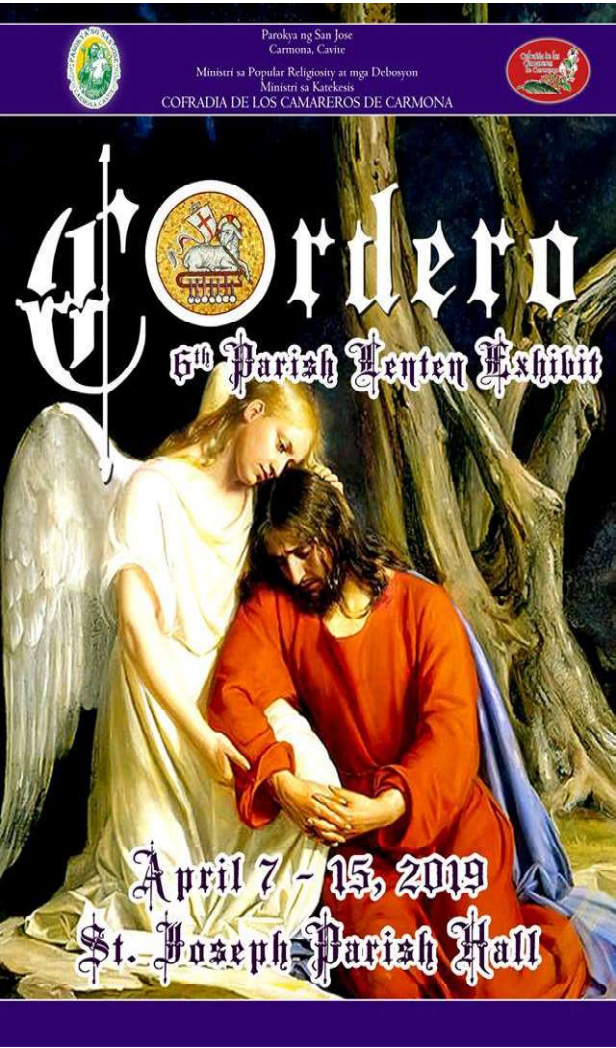
Like the church in Imus, the “Retablo Mayor y Menores and the complex of the Church of Nuestra Señora de Candelaria, more known as the Silang Church, has been declared a National Cultural Treasure in 2016.

Other churches that pilgrims may consider are the churches of Our Lady of Assumption in the upland town of Maragondon, the Sto. Niño de Ternate Parish that sits in the coastal town located in the western part of Cavite, and the St. Gregory the Great Parish in Indang town.

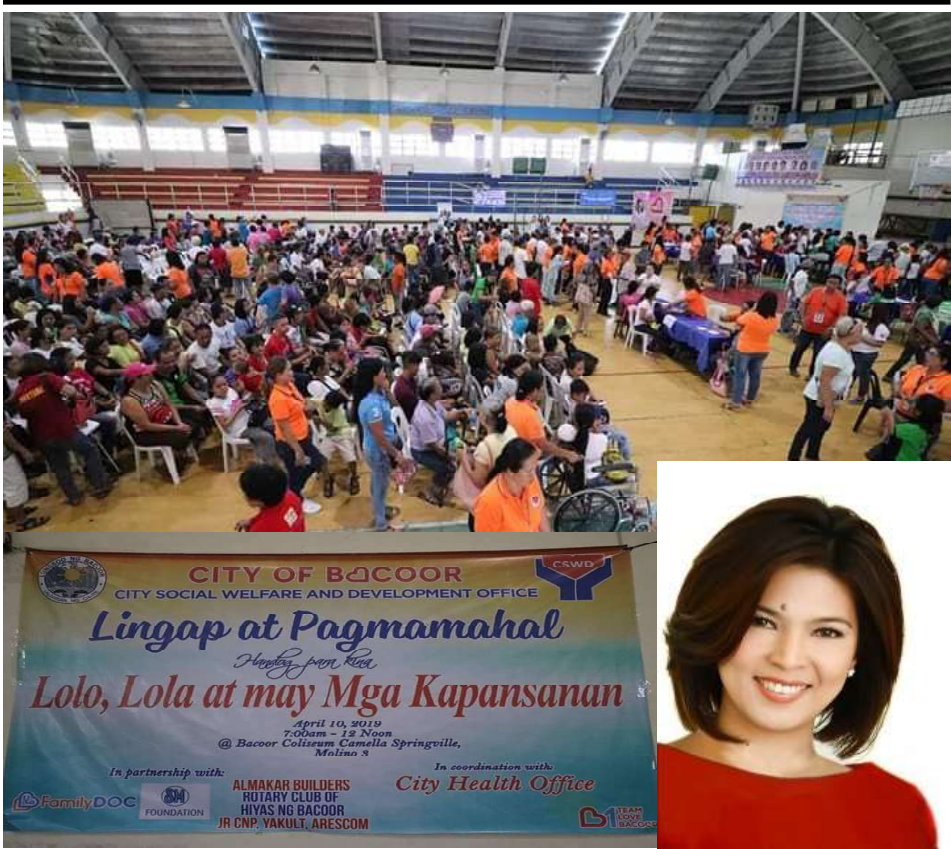
The “Our Lady of Assumption” served as Emilio Aguinaldo’s base during the Philippine Revolution in 1897, while Ternate’s “Sto. Niño” was said to be ruined by the

Religious superiors blast red-tagging of missionaries



The country's religious superiors expressed concern about the safety of missionaries tagged by the military as fronts of the communist underground movement.

The Association of Major Religious Superiors of the Philippines (AMRSP) said that red tagging would endanger the security of missionaries.

"Red tagging, accusing individuals and organizations as communist terrorists, is inimical to democracy and respect for human rights," the AMRSP said in a statement.

They fear that red tagging "can lead to warrantless arrest, detention without charges, torture, enforced disappearances and extrajudicial killings".

AVOID HEAT STROKE THIS HOLY WEEK - DOH



The Department of Health (DOH) today advises the public to take precaution as it joins the nation in the observance of Holy Week.

properly worn.

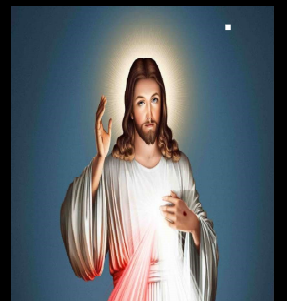

If you wish to avoid the fierce hatred of the evil one, then refrain from striving for holiness. Satan will still hate you, but he will not hate you as much as the saint. But, of course, this is foolishness! Why would anyone avoid holiness so as to avoid the hatred of the evil one? It is true that the closer we come to God, the more the evil one will seek to destroy us. Though it's good to be aware of this, it's nothing to fear. In fact, attacks from the evil one should be seen as signs to us of our closeness to God (see Diary #412).

Reflect, today, upon any ways that you have felt overwhelmed by fear. Very often, this fear is the fruit of you letting the trickery and malice of the evil one affect you. Instead of letting fear affect you, allow the evil that confronts you to be the cause of your increase in faith and trust in God. Evil will either tear us down or become an opportunity for us to grow in God's grace and strength.



Lord, fear is useless, what is needed is faith. Increase my faith, I pray, so that I will be daily under the control of Your gentle inspirations and not under the control of the fear caused by the attacks of the evil one. Jesus, I trust in You.
